Q: What are your main goals for the club?

The main goal of this club is to provide much needed help to children all over the world. At the moment, our focus is helping children in China and Africa. We recently held a bake sale with an end result of \$267, and we are planning on using the money to sponsor a child in China in foster care for about 5 months.



Relay for Life in its 20th Season

On June 3rd 2016, Cheshire held its 20th annual Relay for Life event, a fight against cancer.

Relay for Life is a non-profit organization, that raises money to find a cure for cancer. Once a year, a day is dedicated to remembering our loved ones lost, celebrate the survivors, and continue to fight back. This fight against cancer was created back in 1985 by Dr. Gordy Klatt, who resides in Tacoma, Washington. Looking to fundraise for his local American Cancer Society, Klatt thought up ideas on what he could do to achieve his goal. In May of 1985, Klatt spent 24 hours walking the track at the University of Puget Sound, asking friends and family to donate 25 dollars for every thirty minutes walking beside him. After the event was over, he raised a total of 27,000 dollars for his cause. Although Klatt had raised a tremendous amount to help fight cancer, his fight was not over yet. He began to extend similar ideas across the nation, creating the Relay for Life event. To this day, there are now about 4 million people helping to end cancer together. Cheshire has had the privilege to be a part of this event for 20 years, and continues to make a big impact to help find a cure to cancer.

When entering Dodd Middle School, I was welcomed into the Future Educators of America club and one of our main events that year was joining Relay for Life of Cheshire, and raising money

as a club. We hosted bake sales, luminaria sales, tag sales, and door-to-door selling. After experiencing the event, I decided I wanted to help more. The next year in 8th grade, I became the captain for the relay for life team of FEA. We continued to raise money, and had another successful year in helping find a cure to cancer.

This year at CHS, I currently have a relay team comprised of 13 people. We have had many fundraisers this year, working hard to raise as much money as we can. Two unique fundraisers we have had this year were fundraising nights, at Panera Bread and Moe's Southwest Grill. We handed out flyers to family and friends, asking them to go to the restaurants on our fundraising night, and got a donation from their meal. In addition to this, we have also held various luminary sales

around Cheshire, selling the bags in honor or memory of a loved one who has battled cancer. These fundraisers took place at places such as Mike's Sideline Grill and Bagelicious. As we continue to individually fundraise, our team is preparing for our last big team fundraiser. We are collecting cans and bottles, which we will all go and cash in together and add the money to our team donations.

Overall, I have helped raise over \$6,000 to find a cure to cancer. Relay for Life has had a big impact on my life, and I will continue to be a part of it throughout my next two years at Cheshire High School. After hearing about this traumatic event, a group of students asked to start B1-Day.

"They went to one of our retired guidance counselor and said they were scared because there were a lot of bomb threats and a lot of stuff was happening here and everyone was getting kind of segregated" says Mrs. Schumacher, one of our school counselors who used to coordinate B1-Day. This year, B1-Day was coordinated by one of the assistant principals, Mr. Sansoucy. Due to being his last year as assistant principal, because he is retiring, he

wanted to make a B1-Day go to another level. This year's B1-Day consisted of another take on the panel called StoryCorps. This had students, parents, or faculty members have a discussion in front of the other students to discuss each other's point of view on a specific topic. The topics varied from a freshmen talking with a senior to a member of the Young Democrats talking to a member of the Young Republicans. The panel was then followed by a guest speaker, Hasher Nasim, who discussed his view as a Muslim-American. After that, the students were shown the B1-Day video. Most of videos had a humorous quality to it so that students can connect and understand the concepts. After that students went through a series of workshops such as "Cards You're Dealt With" and "What Makes Us Unique."

"When there's a sense of community in any organization whether it is school or work, there's a sense that we kind of know each other and everyone is comfortable with each other, there is a more positive community" states Mr. Sansoucy. But from what it came out to be, B1-Day seemed to be a success. Students enjoyed different parts of the day and had many opinions about them. Hopefully B1-Day continues to get better every year!


White has fond memories of her years teaching.

For these reasons alone, international colleges are often overlooked by high school students in the United States. Whatever the case may be, one must remain open-minded to all the amazing universities around the world. One of these universities being the worldrenowned Oxford University. Oxford University is not only the home of many Harry Potter scenes, but also also a highly qualified academic school, proven by the fact that it is ranked #5 on US News Best Global Universities List.

Located 60 miles north of London, the university's history is both lengthy and fascinating. As the second-oldest surviving university, the school can trace it's roots all the way back to King Henry II in 1167. The university has 38 colleges and four academic divisions and the total number of undergraduate students is around 20,000, making it a fairly large college. In 2015, 563 students from the US applied to the school and 40 were accepted (7% acceptance rate).

Have you ever seen the show American Ninja Warrior? If not, it is a reality television show on NBC that airs during the summer, where contestants try to conquer the world's hardest obstacle course. If you watch the show and think "hey, I want to try that" like most others viewers, you now have the chance at New Era Ninjas in Hamden. It is the only gym devoted to ninja warrior in Connecticut, and has an advantage over regular gyms. according to owner Thomas Alberti.

"It's the most fun way to get in shape there could be. You lift a weight, you lift a weight. Wonderful. Here, there are new obstacles every week to challenge your abilities and to improve upon them" said Alberti, who has been coaching gymnastics for 33 years.

The atmosphere in a ninja gym also differs from being on a team sport, as Drechsel explained.

"Team sports, you obviously want to win" said Drechsel. "When you do ninja warrior, you want to be the best you. We're all looking to help each other out. If I get someone in here, I want to see what he/she's got. I want to help them. I want them to get stronger, learn some stuff, and if they happen to surpass me that's good. That drives me to be better. Maybe I can learn something"

Derrick Matthews, a senior at Southern Connecticut State University, is



a member of the gyms "ninja squad". He also one of the 70,000 people that sent in an application video for season 8. When asked about how the gym has changed him. he had nothing but positive things to say.

"This is a fantastic experience. Definitely try it out. I never thought that I would be in the position I am right now. This is something to try, and see where it takes you. It makes you stronger and a better person," said Matthews.

As for the future of the sport, Dreschel doesn't know exactly where it will go. He said that on American television, everything has a due date. People will get bored of it eventually, which he predicted would be about 10 years. When Alberti was asked the same thing, he referred the future to the youth.

"The adults will always want to do it, but for it to be a viable sport from the business sense, the kids need to be the one that generate the income for these places to grow," said Alberti, who hopes to see a national program for kids/teens developed within the year.

If you want a fun workout and be able to feel good about yourself, head over to New Era Ninjas this summer. Their slogan is "Together, we overcome obstacles". which includes physical and mental obstacles. As for the show, episodes will air on Wednesdays throughout the summer, beginning on June 1st.


What extracurriculars have you been a part of during your time at CHS?








Male Visual Artist
