## Collegeboard's poor response to COVID-19

With most of this school year being under hybrid scheduling. there were half as many days to teach students in person, as well as less time and/or personal attention for many students to learn the information. For those in Advanced Placement (AP) classes, this was a frustrating situation. To solve this, the AP exams should not only have been shortened, but the entire curriculum as well.

With the last of the AP tests completed, now is as good a time as ever to look back on the year. Because of the constraints COVID-19 had placed on schools, it was a miracle that students were even able to return to school at all - not without its restrictions, however.

"I was kind of worried about the test. It really felt like there was not enough time to properly prepare for the exams," Timothy Rivas ('21) said.

Despite the time constraints, the situation was not completely unfair. Understanding that teaching would be much harder than usual due to the pandemic, curricula for many AP classes were changed. Many had felt that the content taught would no longer be as broad as previous years, and the exams were made to reflect this.

Still, although the material may have changed slightly for the tests, they were still as long and arduous as ever. Last year, most if not all AP tests were only around fifty minutes long, being conducted completely online. It is agreed that the exams last year were too easy to succeed on, but many had assumed coming into this year that it would be at least around the same level of difficulty. This was far from the case this year. For many students across the country, this meant losing out on what would be valuable college credits. Not all

Being in a hybrid model half-distance and half-inperson — for the better part of this school year may have made learning the material more difficult, but teachers did their best to make it manageable. Most teachers have had some way for students not there in person an opportunity to catch up via videos or live streams. This may not have been the case for every teacher, but there is the sentiment that teachers did an adequate job of catching students

work, which definitely did not lead to any confidence for my exams throughout the year," Rakesh Conway ('21) said.

But this effort had come in part wholly from the teachers here at Westhill - who had to go the extra mile to prepare students. The AP curriculum in many classes were still too long and too broad for students to understand and comprehend the material in the time allotted to them, which, as mentioned previously, was around half as much time in school in-person. There

"I think how disrupted the entire school year was, given CO-VID-19 cases, mandatory quarantines, hybrid learning, asynchronous learning— and that is not just me speaking on behalf of Westhill, but the entire country, where some schools and some states did not have any in-person learning," Mr. Petrone, history teacher, said.

"Some states had some ridiculous policies with the amount of work that could be assigned, because some only

saw their students in-person for 40 minutes a week. Collegeboard should have taken that into account when making their exam. Across the country, students are not on an equal playing field. When every school district has their own rules on how long they can see their students, a universal test does not take any of that into consideration," Mr. Petrone continued.

This brings up a very important point—just the very idea of a universal test during the pandemic is a bad one, considering the fact that attendance policy will differ from school to school. While Stamford Public Schools, and by extension, Westhill, was able to enact the hybrid system, this was largely in part due to Connecticut's status handling of the pandemic. Other states, however, such as New York, did not have such liberty with their schooling. Many schools were closed due to Mayor de Blasio's two-case rule, leading to most of their school year being online, according to the New York Times. Thus, it can not be expected that New York students would be able to learn the entire AP curriculum — and it can not be expected that students from other states with similar situations would be able to.

By and large, the impact COVID-19 would have on each state, district, and school, could not have been predicted. But everyone knew that the situation would be unpredictable — and it was then that Collegeboard should have had the foresight to shorten their curriculums and tests substantially to accommodate for the inevitable difficulties that would occur this year.

#### Olympics bans "Black Lives Matter" apparel

In 2020, the Olympics was an exciting event that many people looked forward to, especially because of the recent COVID-19 pandemic. Numerous nations around the world, Canada and Australia, announced that they would refuse to allow their athletes to play in the 2020 Olympics without a delay. The President of the International Olympic Committee (IOC), Thomas Bach, and Japan's Prime Minister, Shinzo Abe, postponed the Olympics to take place Summer of 2021 to allow the world to recover.

The IOC has recently announced new rules to take place during the Summer 2021 Olympics in Tokyo, Japan. In past games, people worldwide attend the Olympics to cheer on their favorite athlete. With recent circumstances, it was announced that overseas visitors are not eligible to attend the Olympics to limit social interaction.

After surveying nearly 4,000 competing athletes, it was discovered that 70% of them believed political messages should be banned. It was said that it is "not appropriate to demonstrate or express their views" in the games. The IOC confirmed a ban on "demonstration or political, religious, or racial propaganda." This includes slogans such as "Black Lives Matter" (BLM) on apparel or a fist up during the games. Words such as "peace, respect, inclusion, equality, and solidarity" are all allowed to be on apparel.

Demonstrations of political or racial propaganda are not permitted "at all Olympic venues, including: on the field, in the Olympic village, during the medal ceremonies, the opening, closing or other official ceremonies"

according to Rule 50 Guidelines.

"It is 100% wrong banning BLM apparel. Wearing it is a freedom of expression. Banning it prevents people from expressing their opposition to racism," Sydney Greene (SHS '22) said.

If any athlete disregards this ban, they can be punished by the IOC and receive consequences. Although these consequences depend on a case-by-case basis, they may even result in disqualification. With millions of viewers watching the game, there is an opportunity of creating social change. By banning fists in the air, kneeling and BLM apparel, this is impossible to happen.

"I am honestly disheartened to hear about the decision of the International Olympic Committee. While the IOC claims its decision is in favor of minimizing "political demonstrations," it is quite simply a blatant example of censorship and moves only to delegitimize the struggle of Black citizens in the United States. As a committee and event of such high reputation, the IOC should move to support international issues, or at least allow its participants the courtesy of free speech. BLM demonstrations are less "political," and more an act of necessary solidarity that empowers Black citizens globally. Furthermore, such demonstrations have the potential to gain support at a large, well-viewed, international event. As such, this is a true loss for Black competitors and audiences. Even more, however, this is a poor decision that truly reflects the minimal dedication towards activism globally." Zara Williamson ('22) said.

During the Summer Olympics of 1968, Tommie Smith and John Carlos used their victory of the bronze and gold medal, to draw

attention to the racial tensions that were occurring in the US. With the Civil Rights movement and the assassination of Martin Luther King Jr. being so recent, they felt it had to be done.

"We had to be seen because we couldn't be heard," Smith said.

With everything going on in today's society, athletes must do the same now, and take advantage of the millions of eyes on the game, and use this opportunity to bring attention to racial injustice. Many people have spoken out to the IOC and urged them to revise this decision.

"This sends the WRONG message about basic human rights & I urge the Olympic Committee to reverse this decision," anthropologist Thomas Crump said.

Overall, the International Olympic Committee should rethink this decision because it is time for change to occur.

#### Should the COVID-19 vaccine be required in high school?

As more and more COV-ID-19 vaccines are being administered across the country and more are becoming available, it is an important time to consider if vaccines in high schools

should be required.

Being that the vaccine has shown no severe common side effects beyond soreness and cold symptoms, it appears to be the safest option. Vaccines for a variety of other diseases are already required in schools. It is only logical that COVID-19 should be among those requirements. Although COVID-19 has started to decline, it still poses a major threat against older groups as well as those with compromised immune systems. One's family members may be at stake if the vaccine is not taken. Another point to consider is while the chance for a healthy teen to die from COVID-19 is very low, it is not zero. Even if one does have CO-VID-19 without any severe symptoms or even no symptoms, one can still spread it and will be required to quarantine away from others. As such there are not enough reasons that are sufficient in outweighing the benefits of taking the vaccine. The only real danger is an allergic reaction which is incredibly rare, and only especially present in people with a history of allergy.

the American Medical network Association (JAMA network) has approximated that anaphylactic shock will occur in "2.5 to 11.1 cases per 1 million doses, largely in individuals with a history of allergy.

tion that can only be answered by students and their families along with their healthcare provider. It is a very individual decision and one, I do not believe, should be mandated by the state," Ms. Cutolo, health teacher, said.

It is very true that the CO-

VID-19 vaccine was rushed by FDA approval in the interest of public safety and therefore is fairly untested when compared to other vaccines. It is also true that the disease poses a minimal threat to teenagers and that they only comprise about seven to eight percent of the population.

However, the reason why it is important for younger people to get vaccinated is so it does not spread to their more vulnerable family members that are in more danger from the illness. It is also more likely that those aged 12 to 17 would be more willing to get the vaccine than other age groups, which would help reach the 90% immunity that is needed for the whole population to be safe from COVID-19. The reason that they would be more likely to get it is that their immune systems are among the strongest of all age groups and would pose the least practical risk to their health.



#### A look into the Israeli-Palestinian conflict

For about 100 years, an ongoing struggle between Israel and Palestine has been taking place. Although there have been various attempts to resolve the issue as a part of the Israeli-Palestinian peace process, nothing has managed to firmly resolve it, which is why it is important to recognize how the conflict began in the first place.

The Israel-Palestine conflict began in 1948 with the establishment of Israel with the fall of the Ottoman Empire. When the British took control of the Palestine region in 1916, they took control of Palestine and in 1923 established a homeland for the Jewish within its borders. By 1947, Palestine had been under British rule for over twenty years and the United Nations (UN) then proposed to split Palestine into two sections: a Jewish state and an independent Arab state.

According to BBC, "Tensions between the two peoples grew when the international community gave Britain the task of establishing a 'national home' in Palestine for Jewish people. For Jews, it was their ancestral home, but Palestinian Arabs also claimed the land and opposed the move."

This can be viewed as the birth of the modern Israeli-Palestinian conflict, wherein the two ethnic groups have fought for control of this territory.

Only a year after this plan was proposed, in 1948 Britain withdrew their claim on Palestine due to the conflict. Israel then declared itself an independent state, implementing the plan to split Palestine into two. This began the Arab-Israeli War between Israel and five Arab nations to prevent Israel from forming an autonomous government. By 1949, Israel controlled more than two-thirds of what the British controlled. Tensions only grew not just between Palestine and Israel but also between neighboring countries.

According to Britannica, "On the eve of the British forces' May 15, 1948, withdrawal, Israel declared independence. The next day, Arab forces from Egypt, Transjordan (Jordan), Iraq, Syria, and Lebanon occupied the areas in southern and eastern Palestine not apportioned to the Jews by the UN partition of Palestine and then captured East Jerusalem, including the small Jewish quarter of the Old City. The stated purpose of the invasion was to

restore law and order in light of British withdrawal, citing incidents such as that at Deir Yassin, and a growing refugee crisis in neighboring Arab countries. By early 1949 the Israelis had managed to occupy all of the Negev up to the former Egypt-Palestine frontier, except for the Gaza Strip."

In September of 2000, the Jewish Israeli, Ariel Sharon, who later would become Israel's prime minister, visited the al-Aqsa Mosque in Jerusalem. Many Palestinians viewed this as offensive and subsequent protests broke into violence, including riots. This violence lasted until 2005 when the Israel army withdrew from Gaza.

According to History.com, "Palestinians are still fighting for an official state that's formally recognized by all countries. Although Palestinians occupy key areas of land, including the West Bank and the Gaza Strip, some Israelis, with their government's blessing, continue to settle in areas that are generally agreed to be under Palestinian control. Many international rights groups consider such settlements illegal, the borders aren't clearly defined, and persistent conflict continues to be the norm."

"Even though there has been violence on both sides, I believe that most of the violence is unfairly aimed at innocent Palestinians. What is happening is colonialism by Israel and it should stop," an anonymous student ('22) said.

According to BBC, as of recent, the threatened expulsion of Palestinians from East Jerusalem has ignited violent clashes between the militant group Hamas and the Israeli Defense Force (IDF). Over 2,000 homes in Gaza were destroyed by Israeli airstrikes, according to Al-Jazeera, and over 240 Palestinians, including over 60 children, were killed. The IDF maintains that they give 20 minute warnings to Palestinians in Gaza before the area is targeted, while Palestinians have claimed that this is insufficient to justify the number of casualties they have suffered. Over 2,000 rockets were launched by Hamas into Israel, although many fell short and struck Gaza. 12 Israelis, including two children, were killed in this conflict.

This bloody conflict lasted 11 days before an official ceasefire was passed. Violence briefly broke out between the IDF and Palestinians at the al-Aqsa Mosque less than a day after the ceasefire was issued, but the ceasefire held.

The constant battle of these two nations for borders and land has been an ongoing struggle which still occurs today. However, many are not aware of how long this issue has been going on and what the origins of the conflict are and how it began.

"I have heard of the Israel-Palestine conflict on the news but to be honest I do not know much about the topic. I do know though that something serious is going on but I do not really read or watch the news," Fatima Santos ('22) said.

Despite this, it is important to be educated on the issue and stay informed on not just the history behind it but also what is currently going on.

"Every country should help in any way they can despite their issues with one another. They should not think about blaming politicians or others but rather think about the citizens who are in the crossfire and who are the real victims of this conflict," Moinuddin Kothawala ('22) said.

This conflict is more than what is going on today. Because of how far back in time it goes, knowing the history behind it can help people better understand both sides of the issue.

#### Movie theaters open up after long wait

One of the nation's greatest pastimes is watching movies with friends and family. For decades, Americans flocked to theaters all across the country to view new and exciting films never seen before. Unfortunately, the COVID-19 Virus had detrimental impacts on the movie theater industry and the accessibility of upcoming films.

In March of 2020, three major movie theater chains announced that their theaters will temporarily close due to safety concerns of the coronavirus. AMC, Cinemark, and Regal Cinemas are top suppliers of film throughout the nation, and their shutdowns left disappointment for Americans everywhere.

The industry itself felt a dramatic decrease in sales due to the inability of access to movies. Even as more theaters begin to open and increase its capacity, the viewership is still at a low. Lionsgate's new movie, Chaos Walking earned an estimated \$3.8 million in its debut while it cost around \$100 million to make according to NBC CT.

Viewers everywhere express discontent and frustration with the recent shutdowns.

because I was not able to keep up with what movies were coming out. It also was something I used to do with friends, so not being able to do that was hard because we could not hang out as much," Mia Labriola ('21) said.

I do not watch movies as much at home so I liked to be able to see new ones at the theater," Katherine Abbott ('22) said.

Another industry experienced a large surge in viewership due to the closing of theaters. Streaming services such as Netflix and Disney+ have obtained a huge increase of viewers as Americans seek a new source of entertainment. They use enticing new series or movies exclusive to their service in order to reel in subscribers. Last July, Disney+ released the musical movie Hamiliton exclusively for their subscribers. This film adapted musical was a huge success on Broadway, and attracted many viewers to watch or rewatch the timeless classic.

As theaters begin to reopen, many people express their opinions about attending these public spaces.

Following the success of "drivers license", Olivia Rodrigo faced mounting pressure and a world of expectations for her future releases. "drivers license" broke the Spotify record for most streams of a song in a single week, and while it left many fans wanting more, others labeled Rodrigo as a "one hit wonder", claiming she would never be able to reach that level of success again. However, Rodrigo's debut album SOUR proves otherwise.

SOUR contains eleven songs in total. While many fans have pointed out some obvious song writing influences from artists like Taylor Swift, each song is inherently Olivia Rodrigo.

"My favorite song personally is "favorite crime". I know I am not the only one who is obsessed, and I think it is because the album is dynamic and honest. I love the complexity of the songs and their order especially how "brutal" seems like an introduction to the story. I have seen people do a lot of analysis, and I like the theory that the lyrics in "brutal" foreshadow the later songs. For example, lyrics like "I can't even parallel park" seem to relate to "Driver's License", while other lyrics like "got a broken ego, broken heart" relate to "jealousy, jealousy" and "happier" or "traitor"," Zara Williamson ('22) said.

Prior to releasing the entire album, Rodrigo released three singles; "drivers license", "deja vu", and "good 4 u". These three songs each debuted in the top 10 on the Billboard Hot 100, making Rodrigo the first artist in history to reach this level of success with their first three singles.


### The Westword (TW): What does track mean to you? Christie Blonkvist (CB):

#### **Bad Month for...**

Moving America is running out of houses for consumer purchase. With the recordhigh selling prices combined with landlords buying up any affordable housing and raising the rent sky high, it makes the housing market inaccessible to the average consumer. A recent bank note stated that the U.S. was short 2.5 million homes, however it is estimated to be higher at a shortage of 3.8 million. There are 40% fewer homes on the market than last year, and the homes that are available are unaffordable because consumers cannot save up enough money to invest in a home and establish their own equity. Minimum wage has gone up at a much lower rate than in the past, and factoring in inflation, homes are 39% more expensive than they were 50 years ago. Many people simply can not afford home ownership unless something changes soon.



**Spending Money** Inflation soared in May at an annual rate of five percent, the largest yearly increase since August 2008. The rate was over two and a half times higher than the target rate established by the Federal Reserve Board. #### New parking regulations on the hill


Westhill Juniors and Seniors alike have expressed frustration with the new parking regulations on Roxbury Road, where many upperclassmen have to park. On May 4, students were notified via email that students could no longer park on the side of the road next to Roxbury Elementary School, and that failure to adhere to parking guidelines would result in a ticket. This rule breaks precedent for Westhill students, who have been parking there for years.

"I think it is contradictory to tell students that they are no longer allowed to park on the hill while years past we as students have been required to park there due to a lack of a parking permit. It puts students in a predicament as we have to find a spot which most expressed empathy with policymakers

passes are left to overflow onto Roxbury Road.

"Parking regulations are so inconvenient because we need somewhere to go. Not all of us have permits to park in the Westhill parking lot nor do we want to because it is so chaotic. There are new drivers who do not know what they are doing and it is always a hassle to get out, so I park on the hill," Olivia Bachman ('22) said.

The issue of traffic congestion in the parking lot and on the street is central to student safety. On one hand, many students vying for the same spaces may upset the balance that has existed for years between students who park on the hill. But on the other hand, Westhill parking may present a risk to elementary schoolers, who go to school at Roxbury Elementary right above the hill. Some students have also



likely did not exist at the time, which then forces us to park on the hill as a last resort. But we cannot park on the hill because we will get an expensive ticket (for a student), so where should we go? We have to come to school; if we do not it is our fault, but some of the area is already so congested and the us cannot go if we cannot park, so in new regulations may alleviate some of the end I think the change was illogical and not thoroughly thought out for all of the people who would be affected," Matteo Mastrogiacomo ('22) said.

Parking passes allow students to park in the Westhill lot, but there simply are not enough to go around. Westhill's Parking Agreement, posted on the school website, outlines rules surrounding the process of obtaining a pass. It reads, "There will only be passes given based on the amount of spaces available... Spaces will be assigned on a first come first served basis." In other words, there is competition between students to obtain a space in the Westhill parking lot. The students without over the concern that emergency vehicles may be slowed by the traffic on Roxbury Road.

"I think the new regulations make sense. Though it does put more strain on the available parking spaces, that congestion, which is important, especially considering access to the fire station is more important than student parking," Andrew Hicks ('22) said.

While regulations may result in less spaces for students, traffic may dissipate as students find alternate solutions. Carpooling between those who have had their licenses for extensive periods of time and taking school buses are two options students can explore instead of driving individually. Furthermore, students who live closer to Westhill could walk instead of driving. Overall, the conditions on Roxbury Road could improve as a result of this policy, as unprecedented as it is.




